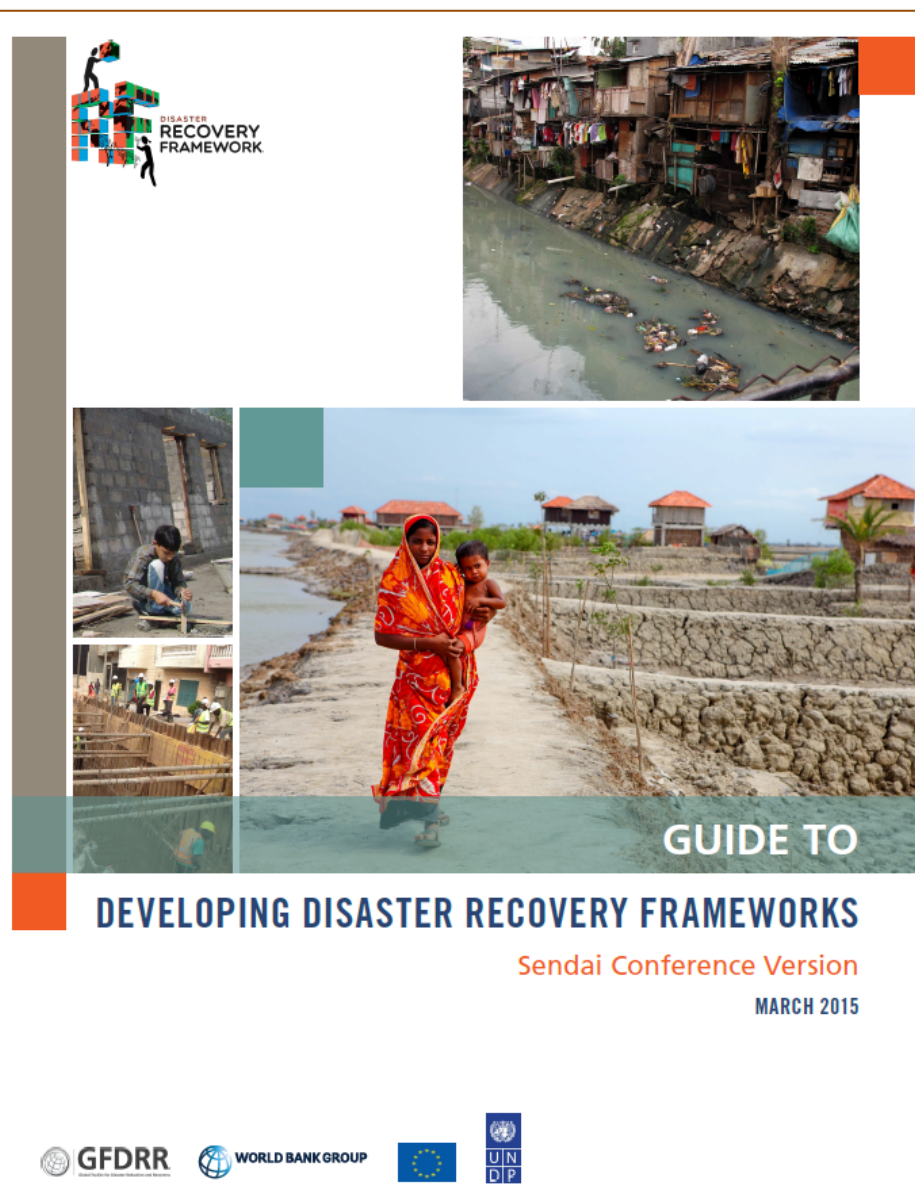

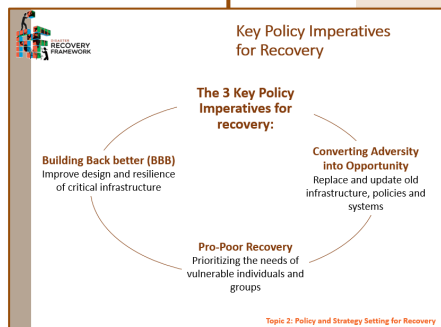
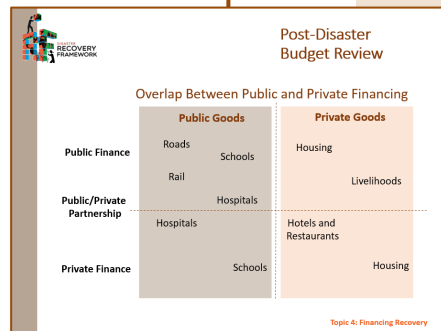


What is the DRF Guide?

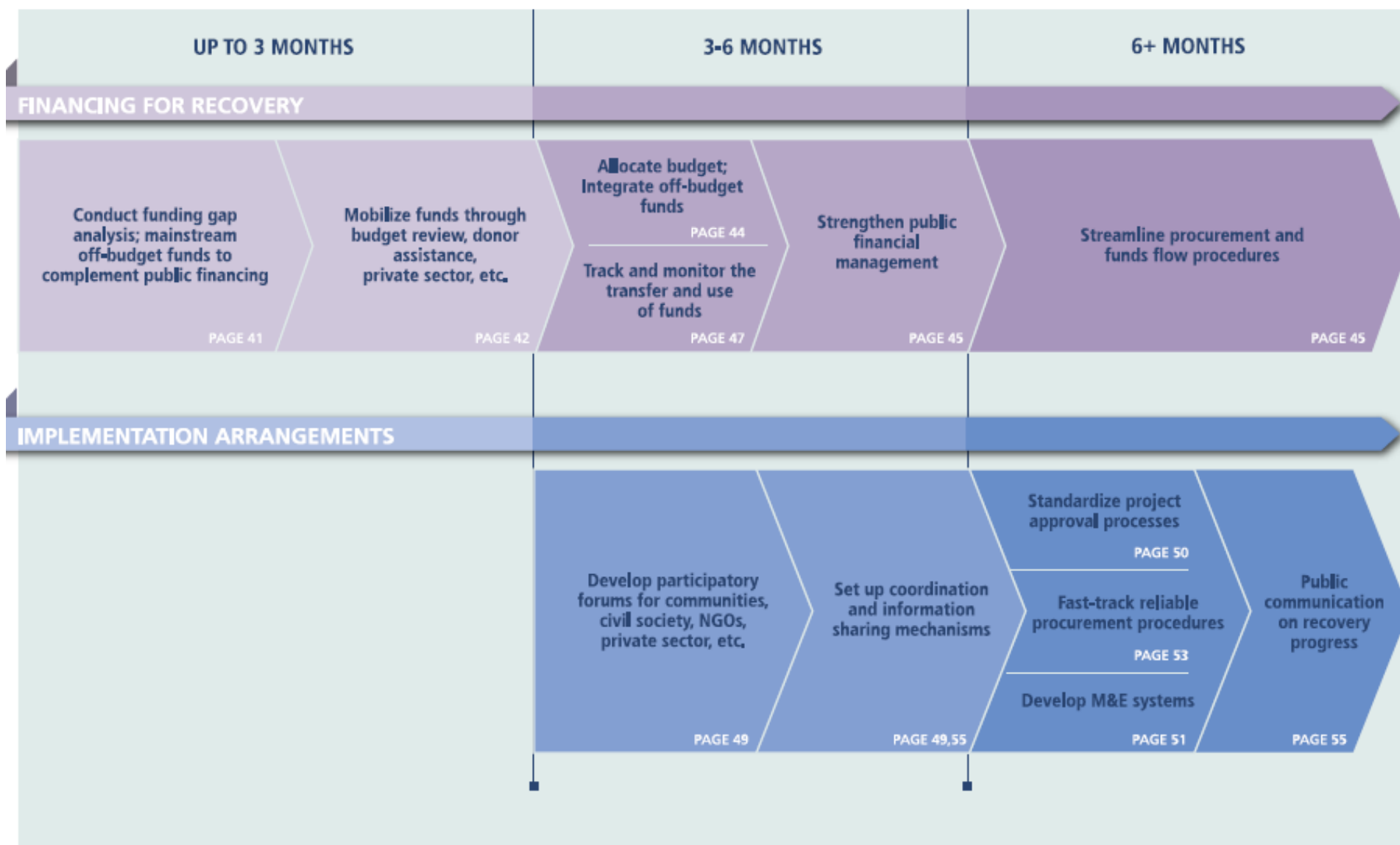

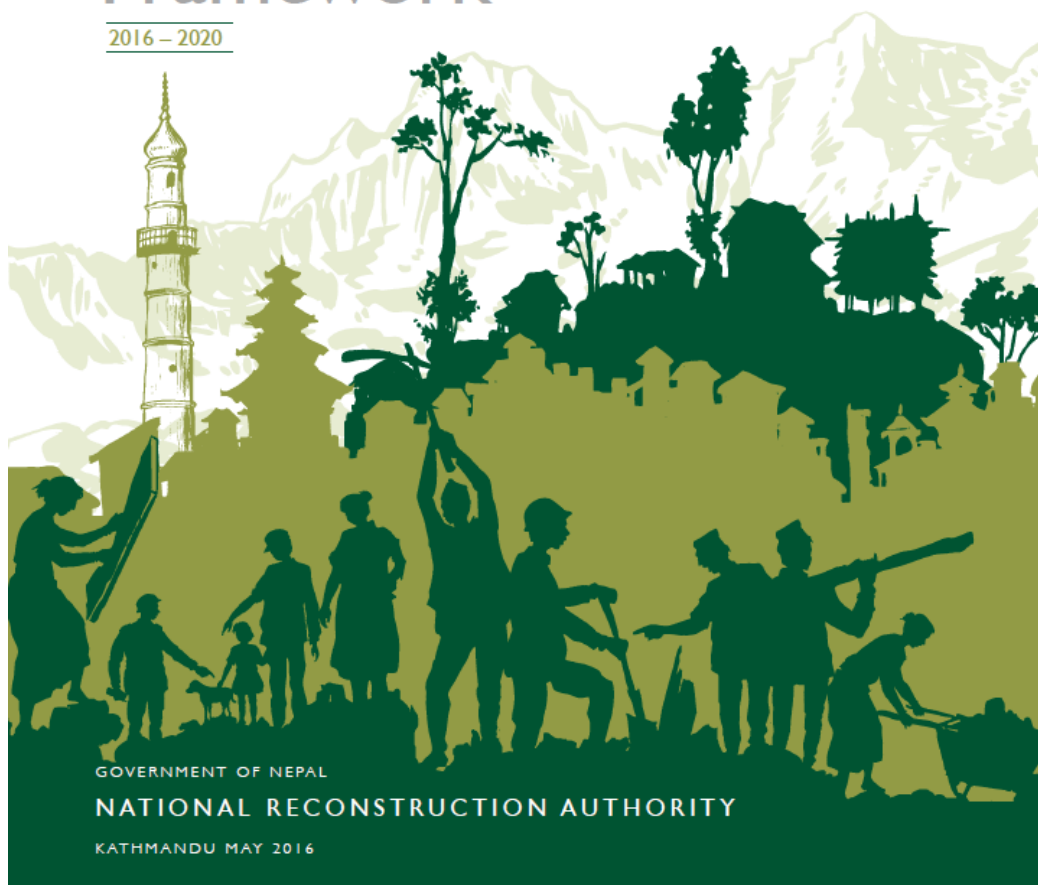

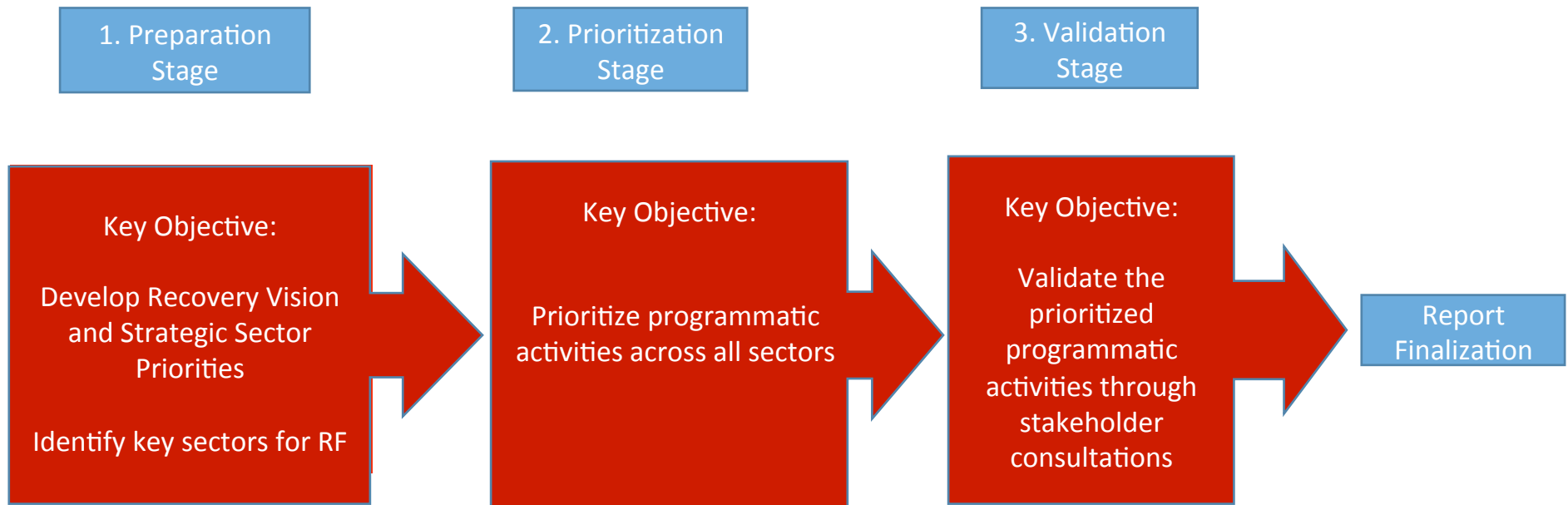

Stages of Developing Nepal DRF



Preparation Stage

Consultations:

- Led by NRA
- Civil society, line ministries, donors, private sector) led by the NRA.

The purpose of consultations is to identify

- 1) Key strategic objectives for the recovery and reconstruction
- 2) Priority sectors for inclusion in the recovery framework
- 3) Cross cutting sectors

Situational Analysis

Sector teams start taking stock of all the progress made to-date on Policy Formulation, Institutional Arrangements, Funding Mobilization and Financing Mechanisms, Implementation and Monitoring Arrangements.

Progress to date is kept in view while developing prioritization matrix for stage 2.
